In 2020 – 312 Adams County RSVP volunteers contributed more than 24 hours of volunteer service to 58 non-profits, schools, government agencies, and faith based organizations.

<u>Volunteers contributed a total of 38,330 hours of service</u>.

Value = \$979,332

based upon the average value of volunteer time for IL, IA, and MO set by the Independent Sector (\$25.55)

(Independent Sector brings together a diverse set of nonprofits, foundations, and corporations to advance the common good. Each year in April they provide an estimate of the value of volunteer time for the nation and individual states. This figure is used as a consistent dollar figure by grant-making organizations and those seeking funding.)

Our major federal funder is now AmeriCorps – and the RSVP programs are a part of the AmeriCorps Seniors programs. (Our major funder was formerly known as the Corporation for National and Community Service and we were a part of the Senior Corps Program).

For more than 50 years, Senior Corps programs have served communities nationwide – for 48 years in Adams County. In so doing, we have made immeasurable impact in Adams County and across the country, connecting older Americans with the people and organizations that need them most.

Under the new name – AmeriCorps Seniors – more than 200,000 volunteers nationwide, age 55 and older, who have made service their "second act" will continue to carry the torch of volunteerism forward throughout the next 50 years. The Adams County RSVP program will continue to bring out the best for our community.



"For their own safety, the residents of these facilities have not been allowed much physical contact with their families and friends, leaving them quite lonely. Elder Justice Corner— SCAMS—We Don't Want to Put a Cloud Over Your Good Will— We Just Want You To Be Aware!

Scammers target seniors because they know the older population is more charitable and more vulnerable. While it's encouraged to help those less fortunate and/or to make a contribution to legitimate charitable causes, we also want seniors to be cautious, especially when it comes to some of the more frequent scams out there.

- Fraudulent gift cards Many seniors find that gift cards are a great gift for adult grandchildren or those on their own. Be careful where you purchase your cards because fraudsters are known to tamper with gift cards displayed in grocery stores. A better bet is to purchase your gift card directly from the retailer at their register or on their website.
- Charity Cheaters—You receive a call from someone who poses as a representative from a charity that may be a made-up cause. Before gifting, check to ensure that the charity is, indeed, legitimate. You can find a list of reputable charities at www.charitywatch.org or by visiting the Better Business Bureau's Wise Giving Alliance at give.org.
- Gift card scams Victims are contacted by the scammer and then prompted to purchase gift cards and send the numbers to the scammer. The scammer promises to pay them back, but never does.
- Online shopping scams We all love a good bargain but scammers use fantastic discount deals to lure you into downloading a fake app that may look like a familiar retailer. Before downloading, check to see if the retailer's name is spelled correctly and/or if there are any reviews posted about the retailer. If there are typos and no reviews, it's probably a fraud.
- Online Secret Shopper You're invited by email to shop online and may even be offered payment. However, to get started you must provide your financial information. Avoid these offers as online secret shoppers are rarely recruited through email or social media.
- Problem with your purchase You receive an email that you believe has come from a business you've shopped at that indicates there is an issue with your order. They ask you to click a link to provide your information again. A legitimate email about your order would provide you with an order reference number and you would be asked to login to your account not click a link.

Remember - Stay Vigilant, Stay Aware, and, If It Sounds to Good to Be True, It Probably is!
